YALE TALE

The success Yale has enjoyed in recent years has made scheduling a challenge. Iona, which played in the NCAA Tournament a year ago and also has been a top mid major program, faces similar issues. So it makes perfect sense for the two teams to meet for the first time on Tuesday at the Hynes Center. Tipoff is slated for 7 p.m., and ESPN3/WatchESPN has the video with Vin Parise and Adam Finkelstein on the call.

The game wraps up what has been a busy start to the season for the Bulldogs, who will be playing their 13th game since Nov. 10. During the stretch, Yale has travelled to the states of Nebraska (Creighton), Wisconsin (University of Wisconsin), New York (Albany, St. Bonaventure), Mississippi (Alcorn State), Delaware (University of Delaware), Texas (TCU) and Pennsylvania (Lehigh).

The Bulldogs (6-6) are coming off a hard-fought 75-67 loss at St. Bonaventure on Saturday. Yale had a 29-25

halftime lead before the Bonnies rallied. Junior Blake Reynolds posted his first career double-double, scoring 14 points and grabbing 11 rebounds, to help lead the Bulldogs.

Yale had two players – Alex Copeland and Paul Atkinson - named to the Ivy League Honor Roll on Monday. Copeland scored a career-high 25 points in the win at Lehigh on Wednesday before tallying 17 points and six rebounds vs. St. Bonaventure. In his last four games, Copeland, a guard, is shooting 66.7 percent (28-of-42) from the field. He has scored in double figures in six straight games.

Atkinson, who leads the Ivy League in field goal percentage at .667, has been quite accurate as well recently. In his last six games, he is 25-of-34 (73.5 percent) from the field. He scored a careerhigh 15 points at TCU on Dec. 2 and had 14 points on Saturday vs. the Bonnies.

Yale has three players averaging double figures in scoring, led by Miye Oni at 16.4 ppg. Copeland (13.2 ppg.) and Reynolds (11.2 ppg.) are the others. In all, seven players average at least 6.5 points.

The Bulldogs lead the Ivy League in scoring offense (78.4 ppg.), field goal percentage (.487) and assists (16.8 per game).

Yale's six losses have come to teams that have a combined record of 44-16 (.733) and only one – Wisconsin – currently is under .500.

Following the Iona game, the Bulldogs will have nine days off for final exams. Yale hosts Monmouth on Dec. 22, its first home game since Nov. 29.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Yale University, founded in 1701, is the third oldest college in the United States and one of the foremost research universities in the world. First known as the Collegiate School, it changed its name in 1718 to honor benefactor Elihu Yale.
- In 1889, Yale students adopted the first college mascot, Handsome Dan, a ferocious and enthusiastic fan at early football games. Handsome Dan inspired Cole Porter to write Yale's famous fight song, "Bulldog, Bulldog." Today, the original Handsome Dan continues his reign from the lobby of Payne Whitney Gymnasium. Yale students also adopted the first school colors (1853), fielded the first cheerleaders (1890) and developed the first school fight song (1892).
- Five U.S. Presidents have ties to Yale. William Howard Taft (1878), George H.W. Bush (1948) and George W. Bush (1968) all received their undergraduate degrees from Yale, while Gerald Ford (1941) and Bill Clinton (1973) are both graduates of Yale Law School.
- Chris Dudley, who played 16 seasons in the NBA, is a 1987 Yale graduate. He was a three-time first team All-Ivy selection for the Bulldogs, and in his career with the Cleveland Cavaliers, New Jersey Nets, New York Knicks, Phoenix Suns and Portland TrailBlazers scored 3,473 points and collected 5,457 rebounds.

HISTORY LESSONS

Yale and Iona are playing for the first time. The Bulldogs' last game against a MAAC opponent was a 70-57 victory over Fairfield to kick off the 2015-16 season. Yale won't wait nearly that long for its next MAAC opponent. The Bulldogs host Monmouth on Dec. 22.

SCOUTING IONA

The Gaels (4-4) are playing only their second home game. They have won three straight games, including a 74-70 victory at NJIT on Saturday. Iona also has a 93-88 win at Ohio on its resume. Rickey McGill (14.5 ppg.) leads the team in scoring. TK Edogi (12.6 ppg.), Zach Lewis (12.6 ppg.) and E.J. Crawford (11.1 ppg.) also average double figures in scoring. Iona won't play another home game until Jan. 5, its MAAC opener against Saint Peter's. Iona was selected first in the official MAAC preseason poll, voted on by league's 11 head coaches. The Gaels won the MAAC Tournament a year ago to advance to the NCAA Tournament where they dropped a 93-77 decision to eventual Final Four participant Oregon. Tim Cluess is in his eighth season as head coach at Iona.

DELAWARE COACH IMPRESSED BY BULLDOGS

Following Yale's 76-66 victory at Delaware, Blue Hens coach Martin Ingelsby spoke highly of the Bulldogs. "We lost to a really good team tonight," he told the News-Journal. "I think it's a great teachable moment for our group to be able to see that team enjoy playing together and enjoy each other's successes because they have a team. It was fun to watch that team because they play the game the right way and they share the basketball and I hope that's something that we can learn from and be better moving forward."

BULLDOGS TO OPEN 2018-19 SEASON IN SHANGHAI

Yale traveled more than 1,300 miles for its opener this season at Creighton. That will be nothing compared to the trip the Bulldogs will take to kick off the 2018-19 season. Yale will head across the globe to Shanghai, China, to meet California in the fourth edition of the Pac-12 China Game presented by Alibaba Group. The Pac-12 China Game is the flagship event of Pac-12 Global, designed to grow the global popularity of Pac-12 athletic programs and universities, fostering cultural exchange through sport, and creating unique educational experiences for Pac-12 student-athletes.

YALE SUCCESS

ONI SHINES AT NIKE SKILLS ACADEMY

One moment among many memorable experiences stood out for Miye Oni during his stay at the Nike Skills Academy in August.

"The coolest part of the camp was when Kobe Bryant came in on a helicopter and shared some of his knowledge of the game with us," said Oni, who will begin his sophomore year at Yale at the end of the month.

Oni was one of only 21 college players invited to attend the prestigious camp, which also included more than 75 high school players. Grayson Allen, Trevon Duval and Marques Bolden, who will all play at Duke this season, and Michigan State's Nick Ward and Jaren Jackson Jr. were among the other collegiate players in attendance. In addition, Stanley Johnson of the Detroit Pistons and Jordan Bell of the Golden State Warriors played on a team with Oni.

Lebron James, Kevin Durant, Paul George and former NBA stars Rasheed Wallace, Gary Payton, Bruce Bowen, Robert Pack and Brian Shaw were also on hand.

"It was a great experience," said Oni. "Being able to play with and against some of the top college and NBA players was very beneficial."

Oni more than held his own against the top competition.

"One college player who has stood out to NBA guys at the Nike Camp has been Yale sophomore Miye Oni. Guys love his ability to score." ESPN's Jeff Goodman wrote in a tweet.

RANKINGS

Yale was picked as the Ivy League preseason favorite by a number of outlets, including NBCSports.com. In the official league poll, the Bulldogs received the most first-place votes (8) but were projected to finish second. In his annual ranking of all 351 Division I teams, CBSSports.com's Matt Norlander had Yale at No. 71, the highest of any Ivy team. In addition, the Bulldogs were picked No. 6 in NBCSports.com's mid-major power rankings.

SCHEDULE

The Bulldogs will once again play a very challenging schedule. Yale has 12 games against teams that won at least 20 games a year ago and six against teams that played in the NCAA Tournament. The Bulldogs also face the two teams that met for the postseason NIT championship - winner TCU and runner up Georgia Tech. It will be a busy start for Yale, which plays 12 games in the first 33 days of the season. In addition, during non-conference play, the Bulldogs have games in nine different states (Connecticut, Nebraska, Wisconsin, New York, Mississippi, Delaware, Texas, Pennsylvania and Georgia).

HOME SWEET HOME

Yale had a 22-game home winning streak, which at the time was the fifth longest in the nation, ended by Harvard on Feb. 11, 2017. Over the last 5+ seasons, the Bulldogs are 53-15 in the friendly confines of Lee Amphitheater. Yale went the entire calendar year of 2016 without losing a home game.

COACH JONES

James Jones, The Joel E. Smilow, Class of 1954 Head Coach of the Bulldogs, is one of the most successful coaches in Ivy League history. Jones' 150 Ivy victories and 272 overall wins are both the third most in league history. In addition, Yale has a .595 winning percentage in league games during his tenure, by far the highest in school history. Jones, the longest tenured coach in the Ivy League who is in his 19th season in 2017-18, is the winningest coach in school history. Jones, who was named the Ivy League Coach of the Year in 2015 and 2016, was recently selected as one of 10 Coaches On The Rise by well-regarded national writer Jon Rothstein.

OFF COURT SUCCESS, INCLUDES TWO RHODES SCHOLARS

In addition to success on the court, Yale players have shined off it as well. During James Jones' tenure as head coach, two Yale players have been named Rhodes Scholar. The most recent is J.T. Flowers, who played for Yale in 2013-14, and was recently selected as a 2018 Rhodes Scholar. In 2014-15, Matt Townsend '15 was selected as a Rhodes Scholar and was named the men's basketball Academic All-American of the Year. Javier Duren '15 was a candidate for the 2014-15 Allstate Good Works Team. In 2015-16, Justin Sears was a finalist for the national Senior CLASS Award, which focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

HEAD COACH JAMES JONES

2015 & 2016 Ivy League Coach of the Year

James Jones, the Ivy League Coach of the Year in both 2015 and 2016, is one of the most successful coaches in Ivy League history. Jones' 150 Ivy victories and 272 overall wins are both the third most in league history. In addition, Yale has a .595 winning percentage in league games during his tenure, by far the highest in school history.

Jones, the longest tenured coach in the Ivy League who is in his 19th season in 2017-18, is the winningest coach in school history. He surpassed Hall of Fame Coach Joe Vancisin, who led Yale to 204 victories, when the Bulldogs beat Holy Cross on Mar. 22, 2014.

Over the last three seasons, Yale has a remarkable 33-9 Ivy record. During that stretch, the Bulldogs have won two league titles and reached the championship game of the inaugural Ivy League Tournament in 2017.

In 2015-16, Jones guided the Bulldogs to the most successful season in school history. Yale won 23 games, the most since 1906-07, captured a second straight Ivy League title with a 13-1 record, matching the 1961-62 team for the best in school history, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 54 years where the Bulldogs upset Baylor to earn the first NCAA Tournament victory in Yale history.

Jones was the recipient of a number of accolades following the season. He was named the Ivy League Coach of the Year for the second straight season and also was selected as the NABC District 13 Coach of the Year for the second straight year. In addition, he was named as the United States Basketball Writer's Association District 1 Coach of the Year, was presented with the Advocates For Athletic Equity Division I Coach of the Year Award, was CollegeInsider.com's Hugh Durham Award winner, and received the Big House Gaines Men's College Basketball Coach of the Year Award from the The National Sports Media Association.

In June of 2016, The National Association of Basketball Coaches selected Jones for an ad hoc committee on NCAA men's basketball tournament selection, seeding and bracketing.

In 2014-15, Jones was named the league's Coach of the Year after guiding the Bulldogs to 22 wins and a share of the Ivy League championship. One of those victories came over defending national champion UConn, just the second time an Ivy League team knocked off a defending NCAA champion.

Jones, who was inducted into New England Basketball Hall of Fame in 2015, also was selected as the National Association of Basketball Coaches UPS District 13 Coach of the Year, was a finalist for the Skip Prosser Man of the Year, Ben Jobe Award as top minority coach in Division I and the Hugh Durham Award as the national mid-major coach of the year.

The Bulldogs have won at least 10 Ivy games four times during Jones' tenure and have had a fourth-place or better finish in the Ivy League for 17 straight years. Jones

has guided Yale to the postseason four times - the 2016 NCAA Tournament, the 2012 and 2014 CollegeInsider.com Tournament and the 2002 NIT. The Bulldogs reached the championship game of the CIT in 2014.

Jones was named the CollegeSportsMadness.com Ivy League Coach of the Year in 2014 after guiding the Bulldogs to 19 wins and a second-place Ivy League finish. In addition, he was a finalist for the 2014 CollegeInsider.com Ben Jobe Award, which is presented annually to the top minority coach in Division I men's basketball.

In 2001-02, Jones led the Bulldogs to their first Ivy League title since 1962-63 and the first postseason tournament victory in the more than 100-year history of Yale basketball. The team won 21 games and reached the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Jones' success did not go unnoticed. He was named the Ivy League Coach of the Year by Basketball America and CollegeInsider.com. Following Yale's weekend sweep of Penn and Princeton that season, Dick Vitale selected Jones as his Coach of the Week.

In addition to success on the court, Jones's players have shined off it as well. In 2014-15, Jones coached Matt Townsend '15, who was selected as a Rhodes Scholar and was named the men's basketball Academic All-American of the Year. In addition, Javier Duren '15, who is currently playing professionally in Europe, was a candidate for the Allstate Good Works Team. In 2015-16, Justin Sears was a finalist for the national Senior CLASS Award, which focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities. In addition, Yale has earned an NABC Team Academic Award in each of the last four seasons and has had numerous individual players named to the NABC Honors Court and Academic All-Ivy.

Jones was named Yale's 22nd head coach on Apr. 27, 1999, and he immediately put his stamp on the program as the Bulldogs more than doubled their Division I win total from the previous season and improved to fifth place in the Ivy League. In 2000-2001 the turn-around continued as Yale entered the final weekend of the regular season in the hunt for the Ivy League championship. The captain of the 2000-01 team, Neil Yanke, signed a free agent contract with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2004. Jones recruited Yanke to Yale as an assistant coach and then was his head coach for two years.

In 2001-02, Jones guided the Bulldogs to one of the most memorable seasons in school history. Yale finished 21-11 and earned a share of the Ivy title with Penn and Princeton. The Bulldogs upset Rutgers in the first round of the NIT before falling to Tennessee Tech at the New Haven Coliseum in front of the largest crowd ever to watch Yale Basketball in New Haven.

Several of Jones' players have gone on to play professionally overseas, including Ted Smith (England), Matt Minoff (Israel), Paul Vitelli (Italy), Dominick Martin (Spain), Matt Kyle (Portugal), Caleb Holmes (Iceland), Ross Morin (Switzerland), Paul Nelson (Romania, Slovakia) Eric Flato (England), Greg Mangano (Spain, Finland), Javier Duren (Holland), Edwin Draughan (France, Switzerland), Nick Victor (Norway), Brandon Sherrod (Italy), Armani Cotton (Germany) and Justin Sears (Germany). In addition, Alex Zampier (NBA D-League), Travis Pinick (NBA D-League) and Reggie Willhite (NBA D-League) have had professional opportunities in the United States.

Five assistant coaches who worked under Jones have gone on to become head coaches - Rob Senderoff (Kent State), Isaiah Cavaco (Oberlin), Mark Sembrowich (Academy of Arts University), Mark Gilbride (Clarkson) and Ted Hotaling (New Haven).



One of Jones' goals when he took the job was to upgrade Yale's schedule, a promise he has delivered on. In 2013, nationally ranked Florida visited the John J. Lee Amphitheater. The Bulldogs also have hosted Stanford (2008), Wake Forest (2003) and Penn State (2001) during his tenure. In addition, Yale has played in numerous prestigious tournaments under Jones, including the preseason NIT, the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic and the inaugural Guardians Classic.

Jones has enjoyed remarkable success against major conference opponents. In 2008-09, Yale knocked off Oregon State, the school's first win ever over a Pac-10 opponent. Jones also has enjoyed victories over schools from the ACC (Clemson, Boston College), Big 12 (Baylor) Big East (Rutgers), Big Ten (Penn State) and Atlantic 10 (Rhode Island) during his tenure.

Jones has gained experience with USA Basketball in his time at Yale as well. He served as an assistant coach to Villanova's Jay Wright for the 2007 USA Basketball Men's Pan American Games Team, helping tutor Georgetown's Roy Hibbert, Michigan State's Drew Neitzel and Indiana's D.J. White. In 2006, Jones was selected by the USA Basketball Men's Collegiate Committee, chaired by Syracuse's Jim Boeheim, as a court coach for the 2006 USA Men's U18 National Team Trials.

Jones also has shared his insight with college basketball fans, serving as a guest analyst on the CBS College Sports Television Network on a number of occasions.

In addition to his coaching duties, Jones has been active in the New Haven community. Each summer he runs the James Jones Bulldog Basketball Camp. In 2002 he was the recipient of the President's Award from the Greater New Haven NAACP at its 85th Freedom Fund dinner.

As an assistant coach at Yale for two seasons from 1995-97, Jones gained a great understanding of Ivy League basketball. He returned to Yale as head

coach after two years as an assistant coach at Ohio University, where he was primarily responsible for coordinating the Bobcats' recruiting efforts and developing the post players. In 1998-99 he helped guide Ohio to an 18-10 overall record and a berth in the Mid American Conference Tournament semifinals. At Ohio, he recruited Brandon Hunter, who was a second round pick of the Boston Celtics in the 2002 NBA draft.

A Long Island, N.Y., native, Jones served as an assistant basketball coach for five seasons (1990-95) at his alma mater, the University at Albany (N.Y.). In his final two coaching seasons at Albany, he helped lead the team to a 44-11 record and two appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including reaching the Elite Eight in 1993-94. His primary responsibilities included recruiting, scouting, supervising the fall conditioning program and advising team members on academic matters. The team was 93-40 during his five seasons on the bench.

Jones graduated from Albany in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in communications and in 1995 earned his master's in educational administration. As a player at Albany, Jones was captain of the freshman team and was selected as the team's Freshman of the Year. He played for and coached with the legendary Dr. Richard Sauers, one of only seven collegiate coaches to win more than 700 games.

Jones is an active member of several organizations, including the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the Black Coaches Association.

Before entering the coaching profession, Jones served as an executive account manager at NCR Corporation in Albany, N.Y., where he managed a \$1.5 million sales territory.

James' younger brother Joe spent seven seasons the head coach at Ivy League rival Columbia and is currently the head coach at Boston University.
